SUBJECT: Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Update

This is the eleventh of my weekly status reports.

Time Remaining: Press conference announcement next week -Friday, May 13<sup>th</sup>.

Current Status of Candidate Recommendations: A summary of significant issues tentatively approved or under consideration is at TAB A. This is a duplicate of what we provided to you earlier this week. I will provide you an update reflecting the decisions reached at this evening's Infrastructure Executive Council meeting. Maps illustrating the recommendations currently in play are at TAB B.

Letter Transmitting BRAC Report: The letter prepared for your signature at TAB C forwards your recommendations to the Commission. It will appear at the beginning of your report.

Economic Impact: Selection Criterion six requires consideration of economic impact. We have evaluated the impact of each recommendation, indicating direct job loss (military and civilian positions eliminated) and indirect job loss (the local businesses supporting our facilities) rolled into a percentage of the total area's employment. The array at TAB D lists localities with the most significant impact, 0.5 percent or higher of local employment. This will be updated to reflect the Infrastructure Executive Council's decisions.

Combatant Commanders (CoComs): The Joint Staff is the nexus between the CoComs and the BRAC process and they have maintained close coordination. We have provided the CoComs information on all candidate recommendations. We have also provided a formal opportunity for CoCom coordination on the report. This is almost complete and, so far, we have received only minor comments which we accommodated.

Financial Considerations: We are "knitting" the financial implications of the most recent decisions of the Infrastructure Executive Counsel and expect to complete this by Friday, May 6<sup>th</sup>. We are also developing an implementation plan to phase implementation in alignment with the availability of wedge funding.



Major themes: The slide at TAB E illustrates the current themes that have emerged from our recommendations as revised by the discussion at our last meeting to include an entry indicating how BRAC will lessen the stress on the force.

Commission: The Commission held its first hearings this week. Their hearing schedule is at TAB F.

Calendar Demands: Your schedule continues to reflect BRAC meetings. These are information meetings. In future meetings where your decisions will be required, we will ensure that we adhere to the BRAC process so that where you exercise your authority to provide direction, we will ensure the record (which will be reviewed by the Commission) is appropriately documented.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

As required by Public Law 101-510, as amended, I am sending for the Commission's review my recommendations to close or realign military installations within the United States. These recommendations represent the Department's best effort to strengthen national security by reshaping our military forces and the domestic installations at which they perform their assigned functions. Volume I of the Department of Defense Base Closure and Realignment Report, May 2005 (enclosure 1), describes the Department's overall BRAC selection process, includes the unclassified version of the force structure plan, and provides all my closure and realignment recommendations and their justifications. Eleven other volumes (II-XII) containing additional information will be released under separate cover. Volume II is the classified force structure plan, which is available on a restricted basis. Volumes III-XII further describe the analytical processes and recommendations of each of the Department's 10 proponent organization -- the three Military Departments and seven Joint Cross-Service Groups (JCSGs).

The decade since the last BRAC in 1995 has been a period of dramatic change. Our national security strategy has transitioned from responding to competing nation-states and the last remnants of the Cold War to confronting a broad range of threats from international terrorism, the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, rogue states and non-state actors. Beginning with the Quadrennial Defense Review of 2001, we reevaluated our global force posture, initiated a major transformation of our military forces to achieve greater combat capability against these new threats, and continued to reconfigure our support functions to capitalize on the latest technology and business practices. BRAC 2005 provided the Department a unique opportunity to adjust its base structure in response to these developments and prepare for changes we envision during the next two decades.



The recommendations I am providing today align the Department's base structure more closely with the force structure that will be needed over the next twenty years, an unprecedented long view. These actions will implement the Department's global reposturing of its forces, facilitate the ongoing transformation of our forces to meet 21<sup>st</sup> century challenges and opportunities, and restructure important support functions to capitalize on advances in technology and business practice. In reviewing its base structure, the Department considered the capabilities needed to support potential mobilization and surge requirements, as well as the unique installation needs of our Reserve Component forces.

The legally mandated BRAC process involved comprehensive analyses covering all installations in the United States and Territories on an equal footing, using military value as the primary consideration. While the Military Departments analyzed installations supporting operational forces, seven Joint Cross-Service Groups (JCSGs) scrutinized the bases and functions that constitute the Department's common support infrastructure. In performing these analyses, I challenged the JCSGs to look beyond Service boundaries to consider joint basing options, including joint uses of critical assets and the creation of centers of excellence. This work was difficult, and I am proud of the accomplishments of each of the 10 proponents.

These BRAC recommendations derived from the proponents' extensive analyses cover almost every defense mission area and affect most of the Department's major U.S. installations. The recommendations follow these themes:

- Basing adjustments support force transformation. Global Posture plans provide the opportunity to transform returning forces through technology enhancements, capabilities-based restructuring, and basing that provides the needed training infrastructure. Other capabilities-based combat forces have been organized from support functions within both the Active and Reserve Army components.
- New threats and strategy drive rebasing. Dispersed forces and activities within the U.S. consolidate on more secure, military-controlled sites. Rebasing creates opportunities to increase combat power and support efficiency while generating significant savings.
- Business-oriented support functions consolidate, capitalizing on state-of-the-art technology and practices. Supply, maintenance, and medical functions consolidate to capitalize on proven business practices. Defense laboratories consolidate into six centers of excellence to encourage better-focused investment strategies.

- Joint and multi-Service basing advances. Joint activities are established in key intelligence functions and selected training missions. The new Joint Strike Fighter, for example, will through BRAC take advantage of a joint training environment. Other multi-Service basing encourages integration and achieves economies of scale.
- Recurring and aggregate savings almost equal the total savings of all previous BRAC rounds. Restructuring support functions generates unprecedented savings. The reduction of support personnel and disposal of land and facilities are less predictive of savings.

The Joint Staff actively participated in the development of the BRAC recommendations. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs consulted with the combatant commanders to ensure that the recommendations did not degrade operational capabilities. The Military Departments retained critical real estate and facilities that would be difficult to reconstitute even through reinvestment or reliance on the private sector. They ensured that the U.S. base structure could support the forces that remain deployed overseas. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff supports the recommendations.

I understand that many of the recommended actions will present challenges to local communities as they face the drawdown of military missions or, in some instances, significant increases in military presence. The Department stands ready to assist communities affected by BRAC 2005.

I am confident that my recommendations will posture our forces for years to come. Increasing combat effectiveness and transforming our forces are critical if we are to meet tomorrow's national defense challenges. BRAC enables both these goals. The savings that these recommendations generate are significant, nearly equaling the savings of all previous BRAC rounds combined. Because the dynamism of the current environment will continue to require us to adapt our forces and optimize our resources, I recommend that the Department conduct a BRAC review at least every ten years.

I have sent identical letters, with enclosures, to the Chairmen of the House and Senate Armed Services Committees and the House and Senate Appropriations Committees. The list of recommended closures and realignments is also being published in the *Federal Register*. Copies of the complete reports will be available on the website [www.defenselink.mil/BRAC](http://www.defenselink.mil/BRAC).

In conclusion, I thank each member of the Commission for performing this challenging task for the American people. Your review is an essential confirmation of the reasonableness of the military judgment behind each BRAC recommendation as well as the integrity and fairness of the overall BRAC analytical process. The Military Departments and the Joint Cross-Service Groups stand ready to work with you during this time of review, providing information and sharing the rationale for the recommendations we made. You have a critical role in securing and enhancing tomorrow's armed forces. I commend you to this work.
